

# USMCA Nebraska State Fact Sheet

#### Nebraska's Trade with the World 1

- In 2019, Nebraska exported \$7.5 Billion in goods to the world.
- In 2019, Nebraska was the 34th-largest state exporter of goods in the United States.
- In 2016, 62,670 U.S. jobs were supported by goods exported from Nebraska.<sup>2</sup>
- In 2018, 1,870 companies exported goods from Nebraska-80 percent were small and mediumsized companies.3

## Nebraska's Trade with Canada and Mexico

## Nebraska's Rank in Exports to Canada and Mexico

In 2019, Nebraska was the 30th-largest exporter of goods to Mexico and Canada.

#### Ranks of Canada and Mexico as Destinations for Nebraska Exports

In 2019, Canada was Nebraska's second-largest export destination and Mexico was the largest export destination.

#### Statewide Statistics and Top Export Product Categories<sup>4</sup>

- In 2019, Nebraska exported \$3.3 Billion to Canada and Mexico, accounting for 45 percent of Nebraska's total exports to the world.
  - Nebraska exported \$1.6 Billion to Canada, 21 percent of Nebraska's exports to the world.

## USMCA Will Benefit Nebraska's Top Export Sectors to Canada and Mexico

Nebraska's top export sectors to Canada and Mexico in 2019 include Food Manufacturing, Machinery, and Chemicals.8

## Food Manufacturing

Nebraska is home to several large food manufacturing 9. In 2019, there were 336 food manufacturing establishments with 37,797 employees. Douglas (Omaha), Saline, and Dodge (Fremont) counties have the largest number of employees in the food manufacturing sector. USMCA contains an annex on proprietary food formulas which requires each Party to protect the confidentiality of such information in the same manner for both domestic and imported products. For the first time in a trade agreement, USMCA contains a chapter on good regulatory practices that promotes transparency and accountability in development and implementation of regulations. USMCA also has a chapter on sanitary and phytosanitary (SPS) provisions, which requires the Parties to agree to increase transparency in SPS measures, advance science-based decision making, and work together to enhance compatibility of SPS measures between them.

#### Machinery

Nebraska is home to many machinery manufacturing companies. In 2019, there were 187 machinery manufacturing <sup>10</sup> establishments employing 9,018 workers. Douglas (Omaha), Hall, and Adams (Hastings) counties have the largest number of employees in the machinery sector. USMCA maintains duty-free access to Mexico and Canada for originating machinery and remanufactured goods for Nebraska's machinery manufacturing companies and contains strong rules of origin protections to ensure that tariff preferences go to companies in the USMCA countries. USMCA also goes beyond any past trade agreement by including important new provisions that will help reduce costs and bring greater predictability to the border for shipments of machinery. At the same time USMCA will ensure customs administrations have the necessary tools to enforce the law. Industry 11 reported support for the

following provisions included in the Intellectual Property chapter: civil and criminal courses of legal action to protect trade secrets, protection of industrial designs, and equal treatment of digital and physical goods. Industry<sup>12</sup> also supports the Small and Medium-Sized Enterprises (SMEs) provisions to enhance SMEs ability to participate in the benefits and opportunities created by USMCA. As stated in Nebraska's trade statistics, 80 percent of companies that exported goods from Nebraska in 2018<sup>13</sup> were small and medium-sized companies.

## Chemicals

Nebraska is home to numerous chemical <sup>14</sup> establishments. In 2019, there were 121 chemical establishments employing 5,667 workers. Lancaster (Lincoln), Douglas (Omaha), and Platte counties have the largest number of employees and establishments in the chemicals sector. USMCA adopted chemical reaction rules to determine origin for most chemical products. USMCA also contains sector annexes on chemical substances, pharmaceuticals, and cosmetics. These annexes promote enhanced regulatory compatibility and trade between the three Parties, while recognizing the regulatory authority of each Party. These annexes commit to build on existing extensive regulatory cooperation on chemicals, pharmaceuticals, and cosmetics between Parties and identify areas of focus for future cooperation. It also encourages the Parties to consider internationally-developed science and technical guidance documents when implementing regulations for cosmetics and encourages cooperation on inspections of pharmaceutical manufacturers.
